About the Project

Each quarter students interview people who impact their lives within and beyond school and, with consent, post the interviews on our class blog to share. Everyone around us has a story, and if we can hear it, we can get a little bit closer to being a community that respects and cares for one another.

Who are you? What is important to you? What have you learned from your life? How do you want to be remembered? So much of our communication is brief or in passing. Think about quick text messages, snapchats deleted in seconds, messages limited to 40 characters. While such digital communication is a part of twenty-first century learning, so, too, is communication across the

globe.

In order to be heard, to be understood, we need to learn more than digital tools. We are learning how to ask questions and listen, but we are also learning how to bear witness to each others lives, to recognize every single life matters equally and infinitely. The Winston Community Story Project is an opportunity to participate in and facilitate meaningful interviews within and even beyond school (friends, faculty, family, the local community, and potentially the global community).

The encounter of coming together with another human being makes possible understanding and sensitivity to diverse cultures and ways of being in the world. Stories teach us this empathy.

We hope this project can be the bridge between school and the homes and lives of the people who walk the halls of our school.
